

Clinical Research Update

MU is the first active clinical study site in the world for a new gene therapy for Charcot-Marie-Tooth (CMT) disease, hereditary peripheral neuropathy

- First patient began treatment in November
- Led by Drs. Dave Arnold and Ryan Castoro with the NextGen neuroscience team
- Industry-sponsored: NMD Pharma
- 4 sites internationally and 3 in the U.S.






MU HEALTH CARE UPDATE

Children's Emergency Department Expansion



- Completely new unit, separate from adult Emergency Department (ED) at University Hospital
- Separate parking and waiting areas
- Seven additional beds (16 total)
- Larger rooms feature nature themes and are designed with kids in mind




Innovative Treatment Options in Mid-Missouri




Holmium Laser Enucleation of the Prostate (HoLEP)

- Minimally invasive surgery for men with an enlarged prostate who have not had success with other treatments.
- Lasers remove excess tissue blocking urine flow through the prostate.
- HoLEP provides a lasting solution and offers faster recovery compared to traditional prostate surgeries.



Pulsed Field Ablation to treat atrial fibrillation


- Catheter device that uses electrical fields to target heart tissue areas that cause irregular heart rhythm.
- Shorter procedure length, reduced risk of damage to surrounding anatomy and better outcomes than thermal ablations.





FY24 By the Numbers: Access to Care

FY25 Budget Variances

- Revenue variance due to increase in MUHC funding of \$12M, or 19%, stemming from additional support for DOCP).
- Compensation variance is reported at +6%, or \$15.8M over budget. This is driven from LOCUMS (+\$6M); Incentives (+\$4.9M) from increased collections & Productivity; and salaries & benefits (+\$4.9M).

YoY Variances

- Revenue growth due in large part to DOCP, making up \$35M of the \$68M revenue variance. SOM has also experienced a large increase in clinical collections, up \$19.4M, or 13.3%, without DOCP.
- Compensation variance also primarily due to DOCP which takes up \$31M of the \$55M variance.
